The Department of the Navy (Navy) proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia (Enclosure 1). This undertaking and its effects are being considered under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended, and implementing regulations 36 CFR 800. The Navy is writing to seek concurrence with the project Area of Potential Effects (APE) per 36 CFR 800.4(a)(1). As detailed in previous correspondence the Navy is also preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the modernization and expansion of the TBR.

The TBR, which currently occupies 5,183-acres, is a premier training facility used by all Department of Defense (DoD) services to practice air-to-ground ordnance delivery, gunnery, electronic warfare, tactical air control of ground attack aircraft, and other combat skills. TBR is under United States Marine Corps (USMC) EIS action proponent jurisdiction and is operated by the Georgia Air National Guard. The EIS considers various alternatives involving three acquisition areas (Areas 1, 2, 3) totaling more than 51,580 acres (Enclosure 2) in the vicinity of the existing TBR.

The purpose of the proposed action is to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons in order to meet a majority of USMC aviation training requirements and achieve readiness proficiency for air-to ground operations.

The USMC shall conduct an archaeological survey of proposed target locations and infrastructure improvement areas (operations tower and support facilities areas, roads, fences, etc.) within the APE to identify archaeological resources. The USMC shall evaluate any archaeological resources within these areas to determine whether they are eligible for the NRHP, or

re-design the project to avoid these resources. The USMC shall survey the remainder of any land acquired by this proposed undertaking in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA as funding permits. A built environment survey and evaluation effort shall be conducted within the APE.

A cultural resources desktop analysis of the proposed TBR expansion area and a 1-mile buffer of this area is provided in Enclosure 3 for your consideration. This desktop provides a review of existing site file data and defines site probability zones, based largely on soil drainage characteristics, as outlined in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001).

A list of federally recognized Native American Tribes to be consulted about this undertaking is provided in Enclosure (4). If you are aware of any additional Native American Tribes or other potential consulting parties that should be contacted please let us know.

A meeting with you and members of your staff at the Department of Natural Resources in Atlanta to discuss this undertaking and survey requirements has been scheduled for February 1, 2011 at 1:00 PM.

We look forward to receiving your concurrence with the APE per 36 CFR 800.4(a)(1), and with meeting with you and your staff.

Thank you and your staff for meeting with us on February 1, 2011 to discuss cultural resource issues as they relate to the proposed modernization and expansion of the Townsend Bombing Range, Georgia. The meeting minutes are attached for your records (Enclosure 1). We greatly enjoyed the opportunity to present the undertaking to you and your staff in person and to discuss our way ahead regarding the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) Section 106 compliance for this project.

We agree that the development of a Programmatic Agreement (PA) is the best approach to meet our Section 106 compliance requirements given the nature and complexity of the proposed undertaking. We look forward to further consultation with your office regarding this PA and to your participation as a signatory party. We shall consult with Federally recognized Tribes affiliated with the proposed project area and with other potential consulting parties, and will invite consulting parties to be concurring parties to the PA.

Please also find two (2) hard copies and two (2) compact disks containing the addendum to the Desktop Cultural Resources Analysis that you requested during the February 1, 2011 meeting. The desktop addendums presents the results of the eighteenth- and nineteenth-century cartographic research completed for the proposed Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) proposed expansion area and its vicinity. The addendum also adds clarity to the location of Fort Barrington, and presents an overview of physical conditions observed at eight (8) proposed target areas visited by Navy/USMC personnel during a brief field visit on February 9 and 10, 2011.

Please note that the shape of proposed target areas are now square rather than round but their acreage remains the same. An additional target (250-acre Laser Bull Target Area) also

has been added in Area 1. The shovel test pit count for those areas where archaeological survey will be conducted totals 6,936. This includes the new target as well as the change in shape of other target areas. We shall move forward with the archaeological survey of these eight (8) target areas.

Introduction

On February 1, 2011, an agency coordination meeting was conducted between the Georgia State Historic Preservation Office (GA SHPO); Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort (MCAS Beaufort); Naval Facilities Engineering Command Southeast (NAVFAC SE); Ecology and Environment, Inc. (E & E); and SEARCH at the GA SHPO in Atlanta, Georgia. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Proposed Modernization and Expansion of the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) and specifically, to equip the GA SHPO with an understanding of the undertaking and gain their feedback on the level of survey effort required.

The meeting commenced at 1300 hours when Mr. Darrell Gundrum opened the meeting requesting introductions of all attending personnel. Topics discussed during the meeting generally followed the agenda (see attached) which was disseminated electronically to attendees prior to the meeting. These minutes summarize the topics discussed during the meeting.

Project Overview

For the benefit of attending GA SHPO personnel, Ms. Alice Howard and Mr. Billy Drawdy provided an historical and current overview of TBR. They explained that the existing range includes 5,183 acres in McIntosh County which is administered by the U.S. Marine Corps

and operated by the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) as a part of its Combat Readiness Training Center. TBR is the primary air-to-ground training range for Marine Corps aviation units stationed at MCAS Beaufort. Additional users include GA ANG, Moody Air Force Base (AFB), Shaw AFB, and McEntire Air Force Base. In addition to the acquisition of land for expansion, the modernization of TBR would include the construction of new targets to meet PGM training requirements. MCAS Beaufort has tentatively identified nine targets (two in Area 1, two in Area 2, and five in Area 3) in the three acquisition areas. The target areas were developed using the known Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs) and WDZ Tool. The proposed targets, range from approximately 150 to 400 acres in size, and would require vegetative clearing of up to 2,000 acres, depending on the acquisition alternative which is selected. Ms. Howard further stated that the expansion area boundaries were in part selected based on such variables as the scarcity of homes and churches in the vicinity, absence of transmission corridors and in accordance with operational criteria, to ensure that they provide the optimal factors necessary to complete their missions.

Mr. Drawdy provided additional detail on the proposed bombing activities at TBR, stating that bombs would range in weight from 20 to 2,000 pounds; they will include: gravity-driven; laser-guided, and GPS-guided types. He also acknowledged that "safety zones" have been established outside of the target areas to account for any munitions that stray from their intended target. Mr. Drawdy further explained that the location of TBR was selected based on specific military criteria, including distance from MCAS Beaufort and the need for restrictive airspace, all offered by TBR. Ms. Howard stated that the Draft EIS will be ready by Fall-or-Winter 2011 and that funding for the project is anticipated in 2014, but may be obtained as early as 2013.

Cultural Resources Discussion

A cultural resources discussion commenced that entailed an overview of the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis, which led to a discussion of how best to handle cultural resources requirements as they relate to the current undertaking and future modernization of the expansion areas.

To initiate the conversation, Mr. Gundrum requested whether a cultural resources survey was needed prior to the completion of the EIS, since the current action is land acquisition. Ms. Shirk requested survey of only the proposed target areas at this point.

Mr. Hendryx provided an overview of the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis, whereby he discussed the property's environment and the results of archival and site file research, and estimated the number of shovel tests needed to complete the study based on adherence to the *Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys* (GCPA 2001). Mr. Gundrum discussed the results of past archaeological survey work within the existing TBR, noting that 2,748 shovel tests were dug during a 1996 survey of 1,106 acres by Panamerican Consultants, Inc. (PCI), including 3 (0.27%) that were positive. During a 1997 survey of 3,377 acres by PCI, 4,433 shovel tests were dug, including 22 (0.5%) that were positive. During these surveys, crew

Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys, as implemented in 2001, survey of the seven target areas in Expansion Areas 1 and 3 (+/- 1,700 acres) would necessitate about 6,082 shovel tests, which equates to 3.6 shovel tests per acre. Based on recognition of the similar topography between TBR and the proposed targets in Areas 1 and 3, discussions began regarding the level of testing and whether there was flexibility to deviate from the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys. Mr. Hendryx recommended the use of LIDAR data to identify topographic features as a method of minimizing the necessary number of shovel tests. In response, Dr. Crass recommended contacting Shawn Jordan with the Coastal Resources Division to acquire LIDAR data. Dr. Crass also asked Mr. Hendryx about the location of Fort Barrington, believing that it was further downstream of the proposed expansion area property than was described in the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis.

Mr. Gundrum also noted that following the acquisition of the property additional infrastructure will be necessary within the expansion areas. He added that survey would be needed for all direct impact areas, including proposed infrastructure (such as roadways), that would need to be established if acquisition occurred and targets developed. The precise location of such features is yet to be determined. Mr. Gundrum asked specifically what level of work needs to be performed to complete the EIS. Ms. Shirk suggested that phasing the cultural resources should assist with moving the EIS along; this work should include survey of the target areas only. Survey of the safety zones and infrastructure can occur after the EIS; this stance was reiterated later in the meeting by Mr. Entorf.

Ms. Shirk questioned the accuracy of the bombing activities and whether they ever miss their target. Mr. Drawdy stated that it is possible for bombs to miss their targets, which is the basis for establishing the safety zones. Mr. Gundrum indicated that survey work would be completed at a later date to account for the possibility of bombs landing outside of the proposed target areas. Ms. Shirk suggested that a Programmatic Agreement (PA) be prepared that addresses the possibility of impacts outside of the target areas, to which Dr. Crass agreed. Ms. Shirk further acknowledged that with the implementation of a PA that there is no need for survey work outside of the proposed target areas at this time.

A brief discussion of the archaeological potential within the expansion areas occurred, whereby Mr. Entorf concurred that the two target areas in Area 2 had the highest potential for yielding cultural resources. Dr. Crass requested that SEARCH perform a more thorough review of 18th and 19th century map resources and provide the results to the SHPO as an addendum to the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis. Further, Dr. Crass requested that shovel test intervals be reduced to 15 meters in areas where historic features correspond with the work area.

Safety zones were again discussed, whereby Mr. Entorf agreed that any survey work within the safety zones could wait until after the completion of the EIS. Dr. Crass asked that a sampling strategy for the safety zones be built into the PA. Preliminary discussions of sampling strategies included:

- the use of LIDAR data to sample areas of higher elevation,
- the employment of a 90-to-100 meter interval shovel testing survey, and
- the use of geo-referenced cartographic data to identify historic features for focused survey (such as along old roadways).

Ms. Shirk noted that military-implemented silviculture activities will need to be addressed in the future, and that cultural resources studies might be required. Mr. Drawdy clarified that management practices for the proposed expansion areas would be in accordance with the current range, which is on an 80 year rotation, utilizing ecosystem management as described in the Integrated Natural Resource Plan. Survey work will be driven by funding, but the target areas may be authorized for survey by June/July 2011 to offer sufficient time to gather data to include in the EIS. Mr. Drawdy addressed the audible effect of the property, acknowledging that it will be either the same or less than what is at the property now.

Mr. Shmookler re-approached the topic of implementing the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys and asked whether there was any flexibility with regard to increasing the shovel test interval, based on the low potential for encountering cultural resources. Ms. Shirk, Dr. Crass, and Bob Entorf requested that the survey work conform to the level of work outlined in the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis document. Mr. Hendryx requested that after the initiation of the survey, if the project's Principal Investigator recognizes that segments of the area mapped as high probability (HP) within the Cultural Resources Desktop Analysis document, would be better classified as low probability (LP), if it would be acceptable to contact the SHPO and request a survey strategy of reduced intensity; all three SHPO representatives were amenable to this proposition. Such variables that might lead to a reclassification of HP to LP areas could include lack of nearby potable water, absence of georeferenced historic features, and comparatively poor soil drainage capacity.

Following this discussion, Mr. Drawdy requested a clarification on how best to proceed with the project. Mr. Gundrum mentioned that completing a PA seemed like a reasonable approach, and that survey would be initiated in the seven target areas located within Expansion Areas 1 and 3, and that once the EIS is completed, survey work would be completed on an asneeded basis within the footprint of future construction areas. Ms. Shirk indicated that Native American groups will likely want to be identified as consulting parties. Mr. Gundrum acknowledged that the Native Americans will be consulted and asked whether the Native American groups shown on the list that was provided as an enclosure to the 19 January 2011 Section 106 letter was sufficient, to which the GA SHPO representatives stated yes. Mr. Gundrum inquired about other potential consulting parties. The GA SHPO recommended including local historical societies. Mr. Drawdy also in response provided a brief overview of the scoping efforts (i.e., fact sheet, Web site, and meetings), where he stated that the biggest concerns were related to access to hunting and reduction of the tax base.

The United States Marine Corps (USMC) is writing in regard to the proposed undertaking to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia (Enclosure 1). This undertaking and its effects are being considered under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended, and implementing regulations 36 CFR 800.

Per previous discussions with you and members of your staff, the USMC is seeking to execute a Programmatic Agreement (PA) with the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) pursuant to 36 CFR 800.14(b), to fulfill its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA for this undertaking. The Draft PA is provided in Enclosure (2) for your consideration. The USMC is affording the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) project details and is inviting them to participate in the consultation and as a Signatory Party to the Programmatic Agreement.

The TBR, which currently occupies 5,183-acres, is a premier training facility used by all Department of Defense (DoD) services to practice air-to-ground ordnance delivery, gunnery, electronic warfare, tactical air control of ground attack aircraft, and other combat skills. TBR is under United States Marine Corps (USMC) EIS action proponent jurisdiction and is operated by the Georgia Air National Guard. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), which considers various alternatives involving three acquisition areas (areas 1, 2, 3) totaling more than 51,580-acres in the vicinity of the existing TBR, also is being prepared.

The purpose of the proposed action is to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non-explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons in order to meet a majority of USMC aviation training requirements and achieve readiness proficiency for air-to

ground operations. The Area of Potential Effects (APE) for this undertaking is defined as Areas 1, 2, and 3 as depicted in Exhibit A of Enclosure (2).

The undertaking includes four inter-related components, 1) the acquisition of land and timber rights, 2) modification to existing airspace, 3) the construction of required infrastructure, and 4) and use of the acquired land for military training. These are discussed in detail below.

The Acquisition of Land and Timber Rights

The USMC proposes to acquire up to 36,828-acres of land to accommodate new targets and the safety buffer zones needed to protect public health, safety, and welfare from potentially hazardous operations that would occur on the expanded range. The USMC also proposes to acquire the timber rights from McIntosh County, Georgia, on approximately 2,990 acres of land within the current TBR, and manage this, and all land potentially acquired as part of this undertaking, in accordance with existing land management practices at TBR. It is anticipated that timber planting and harvesting, under the management of the USMC, would continue to occur on the majority of land acquired as part of this undertaking.

Modification to Existing Airspace

The USMC proposes the modification of Restricted Area R-3007 by the addition of airspace from the surface to 100 feet above ground level (AGL) to the current restricted area, which includes airspace from 100 feet to 12,999AGL.

The Construction of Required Infrastructure

Approximately eight new targets totaling approximately 2,000-acres of land shall be constructed. A new observation tower and support facilities, roads, fencing etc. shall be constructed as part of this undertaking.

Use of Acquired Land for Military Training

The undertaking shall expand current training capabilities at the TBR by accommodating the use of inert PGMs and other air-to-ground weapons. Training capability will be enhanced through the addition of multiple run-in headings for weapons delivery. The Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG), a Cooperating Agency, provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR and would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands.

We look forward to working closely with the GA SHPO on this matter. 

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PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS,

GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, AND ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 51,580 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1-3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG), the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) have decided to participate as Cooperating Agencies; and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

The USMC will strive to undertake identification efforts within up to eight (8) proposed target areas, totaling approximately 2,000 acres, before any land acquisition, should it occur. The intent of these efforts will be to gather baseline information for the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and to identify resources that may constitute "historic properties" (any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included in, or eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places) to aid in the decision making and planning processes.

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be effected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from The GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recover/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO and ACHP to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review.

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, etc. within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) developed as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:
 - i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or

- ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
- c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - ii. Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
- d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any signatory believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, the USMC, GA ANG, GA SHPO, or ACHP may terminate this PA. The party terminating this PA will provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with a written explanation of the reason for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall expire ten years after the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, GA SHPO, and ACHP shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal.

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date


This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP.

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.

The Historic Preservation Division (HPD) is in receipt of the draft Programmatic Agreement (PA) for the above referenced undertaking in McIntosh County, Georgia. Our comments are offered to assist the United States Marine Corps (MC) and Naval Facilities Engineering Command Southeast (NAVFAC SE) in complying with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

Thank you for providing the draft PA for the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range in McIntosh County, Georgia for our review and comments. HPD offers the following recommendations concerning revisions/additions:

- 1. Regarding cooperating agencies, which consist of GA Air National Guard (GA ANG), Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and United States Corps of Engineers (USACE), the 7th WHEREAS clause should be revised to include the following: "and have been invited to sign this agreement."
- 2. Add WHEREAS clause regarding Advisory Council on Historic Preservation participation: "WHEREAS, USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and ACHP has (decided) (declined) to participate; and".
- 3. "Built environment resources" should be changed to "built historic properties" (Stipulation I.A. and II) or "built historic property" (Stipulation I.C).
- 4. Stipulation II, paragraph 1, line 4: "effected" should be "affected."
- 5. Stipulation IV.A, paragraph 2, lines 6-8: revise to incorporate phrase "unless more time is requested" into 30 day timeframe.
- 6. Stipulation VI, line 2: "data recover/mitigation" should be "data recovery/mitigation.
- Stipulation VIII: Add reporting requirement/follow up consultation for any operations conducted pursuant to this section. Recommend within 15 days.
- 8. Stipulation IX.B: replace "etc" with "and similar activities" (line 2) and delete second "developed" (line 3).
- Regarding exempt activities (Stipulation IX): PA should specify that personnel
 with appropriate cultural resources professional qualifications make the
 determination that a particular undertaking falls under these exempt activities.

- Stipulation XI. Add reporting sub-section that specifies preparation of an annual report that summarizes activities carried out under this PA (number of exempt activities, etc.).
- 11. Section XI.C: HPD recommends an initial five year duration beginning on the date of the last signatory that upon expiration (of the initial term) may be renewed or extended for another five years. Also, HPD suggests including a time frame for termination, for example that signatories may terminate the agreement by providing 90 day written notice and explanation of reasons for termination.
- 12. Signatory for HPD should read: Dr. rather than Mr. David Crass.
- 13. Cooperating agencies should be grouped under "Invited Signatory Parties" heading following "Signatory Parties."

The United States Marine Corps (USMC) is writing in regard to the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia. The USMC received the letter from the Georgia Historic Preservation Division dated September 15, 2011 (Enclosure 1). Thank you for your recommendations concerning revisions/additions to the proposed Programmatic Agreement (PA).

The USMC has addressed these comments and is pleased to present a revised Draft PA for your consideration (Enclosure 2). Please note that the Section 106 consultation with Native American Tribes and interested parties is on-going, and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) has not yet indicated whether they would like to participate in the PA. Exhibit C of the PA also has been revised since the last version to include several additional federally recognized Native American Tribes that the USMC has identified as potential consulting parties. In reference to recommended revisions to the proposed PA, please also note that the enclosed revised PA utilizes the broad term "built environment resources" in Section I.A and C and II in lieu of the proposed change to "built historic property" and incorporates a 30 day follow up consultation vice a 15 day consultation in Section VIII (reference revisions 3 and 7 in the September 15, 2011 letter).

Please also note the project Area of Potential Effects (APE) has been altered since our last correspondence. The APE now encompasses approximately 36,828-acres of land identified as

Area 1 and Area 2 (Exhibit A of Enclosure 2), rather than the 51,580-acre APE first considered. Area 2, located adjacent to the Altamaha River, has been eliminated from consideration as it fails to meet minimum training requirements and is frequently flooded and inaccessible for range maintenance and clearance.

As you know, few cultural resources investigations have been conducted within the proposed APE and cultural resources information is limited. The USMC was able to secure access to portions of the private land under consideration for this undertaking to conduct cultural resources investigations (archaeological and built-environment surveys) to facilitate future planning efforts and to provide cultural resources information to consulting parties so they can make an informed decision as to the possible effects of this undertaking. These field efforts have just ended; an Executive Summary of the archaeological investigation and a copy of the built investigation report will be forwarded to you shortly for your information and consideration. The USMC was able to survey approximately 1,725-acres of the proposed target area locations (approximately 1,950-acres) for archaeological resources. Nine new archaeological sites (5 prehistoric, 4 multi-component) and eleven isolated finds (8 prehistoric, 3 historic) were identified during the investigation (Enclosure 3).

Please confirm that we have adequately addressed the recommendations provided in the September 15, 2011 letter, or if you have any additional comments on the Draft PA. If the Draft PA is to your satisfaction, we will distribute it to consulting parties for consideration and comment. PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS, GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, AND ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 36,828 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP has decided/declined (to be determined) to participate; and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

The USMC will strive to undertake identification efforts within up to eight (8) proposed target areas, totaling approximately 2,000 acres, before any land acquisition, should it occur. The intent of these efforts will be to gather baseline information for the Environmental Impact

Statement (EIS) and to identify resources that may constitute "historic properties" (any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included in, or eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places) to aid in the decision making and planning processes.

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO and ACHP to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO and ACHP as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:
 - i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
 - ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
 - c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
 - d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC,

Cooperating Agencies, GA SHPO, and ACHP shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.



The Historic Preservation Division (HPD) is in receipt of the report entitled "Reconnaissance Survey – Historic Built Environment, Portions of the Proposed Townsend Bombing Range Expansion Area, McIntosh and Long Counties, Georgia" prepared by Michelle Michael and dated February 21, 2012. Our comments are offered to assist the United States Marine Corps (USMC) and Naval Facilities Engineering Command Southeast (NAVFAC SE) in complying with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

Based on the information provided in the reconnaissance level survey report, HPD understands that the area of potential effects (APE) for the undertaking has been defined as expansion Areas 1 and 3 and that only five of the 31 historic structures included in the report are located in this APE. These are Rozier Cemetery, The Georgia Coast & Piedmont Rail Bed, House at 64 Low Country Lane, Snuff Box Canal and Old Barrington Road, all of which are recommended potentially eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). HPD agrees that for three of the five resources insufficient information is provided to allow our office to offer an opinion on National Register eligibility. However, based on the information provided, it is our opinion that The Georgia Coast & Piedmont Rail bed and the Snuff Box Canal should be considered eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under Criteria A and C. Furthermore, we agree that the remaining three resources will require evaluation for NRHP eligibility should the USMC move forward to acquire the parcels within which they are located. In addition, we agree that all properties included in the survey would require further evaluation if the APE is expanded or changed.

The Department of the Navy (Navy) proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia (Enclosure 1). This undertaking and its effects are being considered under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended, and implementing regulations found at 36 CFR 800. The Navy is also preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the modernization and expansion of the TBR.

The TBR, which currently encompasses 5,183-acres, is a premier training facility used by all Department of Defense (DoD) services to practice air-to-ground inert (non-explosive with spotting charge) ordnance delivery, gunnery, electronic warfare, tactical air control of ground attack aircraft, and other combat skills. TBR is under United States Marine Corps (USMC), EIS action proponent, jurisdiction and is operated by the Georgia Air National Guard. The EIS considers various alternatives involving three acquisition areas (areas 1, 2, 3) totaling more than 51,580-acres (Enclosure 2) in the vicinity of the existing TBR.

The purpose of the proposed action is to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other inert air-to-ground weapons in order to meet a majority of USMC aviation training requirements and achieve readiness proficiency for air-to ground operations.

The Area of Potential Effects (APE) for this undertaking is defined as the 51,580-acre section of land identified as Area 1 (11,948-acres), Area 2 (14752-acres), and Area 3 (24,880-acres of proposed land acquisition) in Enclosure (2). The APE is primarily composed of undeveloped timber land. Pine forests have been harvested every 20-30 years in this region since at least the 1950s, and likely even earlier.

Prior to any land acquisitions, the USMC intends to conduct an archaeological survey of select, proposed target locations totaling approximately 2000-acres within the APE. This survey will consist of a pedestrian archaeological survey supplemented with subsurface shovel/auger testing with the intent to identify significant archaeological resources constituting "historic properties" that may exist in the area.

A preliminary review of documents indicates that there are no historic properties in the APE that have been identified as "Traditional Cultural Properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance." Pursuant to the provisions of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), the Navy affirms herein that the archaeological discovery of any "cultural item" will warrant immediate consultation with your tribe.

Given the complexity of the project, the Navy intends to develop a Programmatic Agreement that will guide the undertaking and its effects, if any, on historic properties. You would certainly be invited to participate as a concurring party to that document if the archaeological survey identifies any historic properties that are considered important by your tribe.

Consultation regarding this undertaking was initiated on September 13, 2011 previously with the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. The USMC is writing now to inform you of the outcome of the recent cultural resource investigations conducted by the USMC, and to update you on the status of the Programmatic Agreement (PA) being developed for this undertaking.

The USMC sought Right-of-Entry (ROE) for approximately 2,000-acres of privately owned land within the Area of Potential Effects (APE) in order to conduct an archaeological survey of select, proposed target locations. The USMC was able to secure access, and survey, approximately 1,730-acres of the land. Nine new archaeological sites (5 prehistoric, 4 multicomponent) and eleven isolated finds (8 prehistoric, 3 historic) were identified during the investigation. A description of the newly identified resources is provided in Enclosure (1). SEARCH Inc., the archaeological Contractor who conducted the survey, is currently preparing the technical report for this investigation. This report is slated for completion in spring 2012. Enclosure (1) is provided for your information only.

As you know, the USMC is pursuing development of a PA with the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) to fulfill its responsibilities under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). The Draft PA is provided as Enclosure (2) for your consideration and comment.

Please note the project's APE is defined as the 34,681-acres of land (Area 1 11,187-acres; Area 3 23,494-acres) proposed for acquisition in McIntosh and Long Counties, Georgia (see Exhibit A of Enclosure 2). Area 2, located adjacent to the Altamaha River, was initially considered as part of the

proposed undertaking but has been eliminated from consideration as it fails to meet minimum training requirements and is frequently flooded and would be inaccessible for range maintenance and clearance. For operational reasons, additional modification to the footprint of Area 1 and Area 3 also have been made since our last correspondence.

Exhibit B of Enclosure (2) contains the results of a records search conducted for the project area. This included a search of Georgia Historic Preservation Division archaeological site files, as well as a map review of the APE.

A systematic inventory of all plant species located within the project APE has not been conducted. A list of the plant species that commonly occur in Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia, is provided in Enclosure (3) for your consideration. No federally-listed plant species, pursuant to the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et. Seq.), occur within the project APE. The proposed target areas were surveyed for the state-listed corkwood (Leitneria floridana), but the species was not observed to be present.

A survey of the proposed target areas concluded that the federally-threatened Eastern indigo snake (Drymarchon corias couperi), federally-endangered wood stork (Mycteria americana), and the gopher tortoise (Gopherus polyphemus), a federal candidate species, potentially occur within the project APE. The USMC has determined the proposed project may affect, but is not likely to adversely affect, those species. The Unites States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) concurred with this determination. The USMC has determined the proposed project will have no effect on any other federally-listed plant and animal species based upon the absence of those species and the absence of their suitable habitat within the proposed target areas.

The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) has been invited to participate in the development of the PA. The ACHP has not yet indicated whether they will participate. The Draft PA shall be modified as appropriate depending on its response.

The PA will enable the USMC to take into account significant cultural resources should they exist, and to develop the means by which effects on historic properties would be avoided, minimized, or mitigated.

PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS, GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, AND ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 34,681 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP has decided/declined (to be determined) to participate; and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

The USMC will strive to undertake identification efforts within up to eight (8) proposed target areas, totaling approximately 2,000 acres, before any land acquisition, should it occur. The intent of these efforts will be to gather baseline information for the Environmental Impact

Statement (EIS) and to identify resources that may constitute "historic properties" (any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included in, or eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places) to aid in the decision making and planning processes.

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO and ACHP to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO and ACHP as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:
 - i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
 - ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
 - c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - ii. Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
 - d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC,

Cooperating Agencies, GA SHPO, and ACHP shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.

Several tribal representatives and I did attend his retirement ceremony while attending a consultation with the new C.O.

"The regulations also place major emphasis on consultation with Indian tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations, in keeping with the 1992 amendments to NHPA. Consultation with an Indian tribe must respect tribal sovereignty and the government-to-government relationship between the Federal Government and Indian tribes. Even if an Indian tribe has not been certified by NPS to have a Tribal Historic Preservation Officer <http://www.achp.gov/thpo.html who can act for the SHPO on its lands, it must be consulted about undertakings on or affecting its lands on the same basis and in addition to the SHPO."

The United States Marine Corps (USMC) proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia (Enclosure 1). This undertaking and its effects are being considered under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended, and implementing regulations 36 CFR 800. The USMC has already initiated consultation with the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO). The GA SHPO has been afforded project details, and has concurred with the means by which cultural resources surveys will be conducted and the manner in which historic properties will be taken into account.

The USMC is seeking a Programmatic Agreement (PA) with the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) pursuant to 36 CFR 800.14(b) to fulfill its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA for this undertaking. The USMC is herein inviting the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to consult on the proposed undertaking and participate in the development of this PA. Attached as enclosure (2) is a Draft PA for your consideration should the ACHP decide to participate.

The TBR, which currently occupies 5,183-acres, is a premier training facility used by all Department of Defense (DoD) services to practice air-to-ground ordnance delivery, gunnery, electronic warfare, tactical air control of ground attack aircraft, and other combat skills. TBR is under United States Marine Corps (USMC) EIS action proponent jurisdiction and is operated by the Georgia Air National Guard. An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), which considers various alternatives involving three acquisition areas (areas 1, 2, 3) totaling more than 51,580-acres in the vicinity of the existing TBR, also is being prepared.

The purpose of the proposed action is to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non-explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other

air-to-ground weapons in order to meet a majority of USMC aviation training requirements and achieve readiness proficiency for air-to ground operations. The Area of Potential Effects (APE) for this undertaking is defined as Areas 1, 2, and 3 as depicted in Exhibit A of Enclosure (2).

The undertaking includes four inter-related components, 1) the acquisition of land and timber rights, 2) modification to existing airspace, 3) the construction of required infrastructure, and 4) and use of the acquired land for military training. These are discussed in detail below.

The Acquisition of Land and Timber Rights

The USMC proposes to acquire up to 36,828-acres of land to accommodate new targets and the safety buffer zones needed to protect public health, safety, and welfare from potentially hazardous operations that would occur on the expanded range. The USMC also proposes to acquire the timber rights from McIntosh County, Georgia, on approximately 2,990 acres of land within the current TBR, and manage this, and all land potentially acquired as part of this undertaking, in accordance with existing land management practices at TBR. It is anticipated that timber planting and harvesting, under the management of the USMC, would continue to occur on the majority of land acquired as part of this undertaking.

Modification to Existing Airspace

The USMC proposes the modification of Restricted Area R-3007 by the addition of airspace from the surface to 100 feet above ground level (AGL) to the current restricted area, which includes airspace from 100 feet to 12,999AGL.

The Construction of Required Infrastructure

Approximately eight new targets totaling approximately 2,000-acres of land shall be constructed. A new observation tower and support facilities, roads, fencing etc. shall be constructed as part of this undertaking.

Use of Acquired Land for Military Training

The undertaking shall expand current training capabilities at the TBR by accommodating the use of inert PGMs and other air-to-ground weapons. Training capability will be enhanced through the addition of multiple run-in headings for weapons delivery. The Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG), a Cooperating Agency, provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR and would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands.



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PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS,

GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, AND ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 51,580 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1-3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG), the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) have decided to participate as Cooperating Agencies; and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

The USMC will strive to undertake identification efforts within up to eight (8) proposed target areas, totaling approximately 2,000 acres, before any land acquisition, should it occur. The intent of these efforts will be to gather baseline information for the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and to identify resources that may constitute "historic properties" (any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included in, or eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places) to aid in the decision making and planning processes.

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be effected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from The GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recover/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO and ACHP to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review.

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, etc. within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) developed as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:
 - i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or

- ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
- c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
- d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any signatory believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, the USMC, GA ANG, GA SHPO, or ACHP may terminate this PA. The party terminating this PA will provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with a written explanation of the reason for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall expire ten years after the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, GA SHPO, and ACHP shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal.

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.

The United States Marine Corps (USMC) is writing in regard to the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia. The USMC invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the consultation for this undertaking and the development of a Section 106 Programmatic Agreement; the ACHP responded on September 6, 2011 (Enclosure 1). We are writing now to update you of the status of the Section 106 consultation with consulting parties, our efforts to identify historic properties within the Area of Potential Effects (APE), and to once again invite the ACHP to participate in this consultation and the development of the Programmatic Agreement for this undertaking.

As you know, the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) was afforded details of the undertaking and recommended the development of a Programmatic Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.14 (b) (1) (ii) as the effects of this undertaking on historic properties, should they be present, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of this undertaking. The USMC provided the GA SHPO a copy of the Draft PA and they provided minor comments (Enclosure 2, letter dated September 15, 2011). The USMC revised the Draft PA to address their comments and the GA SHPO indicated that the PA is adequate to address effects to historic properties (Enclosure 2, letter dated November 22, 2011).

A copy of the revised Draft PA is provided as Enclosure (3) for your consideration.

Please note that the project APE (Enclosure 3, Exhibit A) has been altered since our last correspondence. The APE now encompasses approximately 34,667-acres of land identified as Area 1 (11,187-acres) and Area 3 (23,480-acres), rather than the 51,580-acre APE first considered, as Area 2 located adjacent to the Altamaha River has been eliminated from consideration. Area 2 does not meet

minimum training requirements and is frequently flooded and inaccessible for range maintenance and clearance.

The USMC has made a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties within the proposed APE. This effort included a record search of the Georgia Archaeological Site Files and historic map review, an archaeological survey of select proposed target areas, a built environment investigation within the APE, and consultation with a wide variety of consulting parties.

The results of the record search and historic map review are presented in Enclosure 3 (see Exhibit B). As few cultural resources inventory efforts previously were conducted within the proposed APE, the USMC made a considerable effort to secure access to portions of the private land under consideration for this undertaking to conduct historic property identification investigations to facilitate future planning efforts and to provide information to consulting parties so they can make an informed decision as to the possible effects on historic properties from this undertaking.

The USMC was able to secure Right-of-Entry for approximately 1,730 acres of land within the APE in order to conduct an archaeological survey of select, proposed target locations. Nine new archaeological sites (5 prehistoric, 4 multi-component) and eleven isolated finds (8 prehistoric, 3 historic) were identified during the investigation. A description of the newly identified resources is provided in Enclosure (4). Based on the results of this survey effort and the results of previous inventories, SEARCH Inc., the archaeological Contractor who conducted the survey, developed a predictive model identifying areas with high and low probability for preservation of archaeological deposits within the remainder of the APE. This model, once the GA SHPO and other consulting parties have concurred with its application, will be incorporated into the PA to quide future Section 110 archaeological survey efforts in the acquired land parcels. SEARCH, Inc., is currently preparing the technical report for this investigation.

The built-environment survey identified one resource within the project APE that was not identified by the pre-survey records search and historic map review. This resource, the Rozier Cemetery, is located within the undertaking's proposed safety buffer zone. The cemetery contains a single marker for Benjamin B. Rozier, a Third Corporal in the McIntosh Light Dragoons. The marker was placed by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and it is not known if this is merely a memorial marker or whether any actual remains are present.

The USMC shall strive to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to historic properties pursuant to the proposed Programmatic Agreement, should the land on which these resources are located be acquired as part of this undertaking.

The USMC consulted with 21 different federally recognized Tribes (see Enclosure 3, Exhibit C) as well as local governments, land-

owners, a local historical society, and various environmental/conservation groups (Enclosure 5). The responses can be seen in Enclosure (6). One Native American Tribe (Eastern Shawnee Tribe) indicated that they wished to sign the PA as a consulting party that concurs. Four Tribes (Alabama-Coushatta tribe of Texas, Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma, Miccosukee Tribe of Florida, and the United Keetowah Tribe of Cherokee Indians) indicated that they have no comments on the undertaking or that the undertaking is beyond their scope of interest in Georgia. Three Tribes (Catawba Indian Nation, Seminole Tribe of Florida, and the Muscogee Creek Nation) requested additional information from the USMC. The USMC provided results of the recent archaeological investigation to each of the Tribes, as well as the additional information (plant species list, record search results, photographs of the project area). These Tribes have not responded with any further comments.

The USMC has performed its due diligence to identify historic properties within the proposed APE. The USMC also believes that, once implemented, the PA shall adequately address effects to historic properties within the APE, should they be present and the land is acquired by the Government.

We look forward to receiving your decision on whether the ACHP will elect to participate in this consultation. Please respond in writing with your decision within 15-days of receipt. The Historic Preservation Division (HPD) is in receipt of the draft Programmatic Agreement (PA) for the above referenced undertaking in McIntosh County, Georgia. Our comments are offered to assist the United States Marine Corps (MC) and Naval Facilities Engineering Command Southeast (NAVFAC SE) in complying with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

Thank you for providing the draft PA for the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range in McIntosh County, Georgia for our review and comments. HPD offers the following recommendations concerning revisions/additions:

- Regarding cooperating agencies, which consist of GA Air National Guard (GA ANG), Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and United States Corps of Engineers (USACE), the 7th WHEREAS clause should be revised to include the following: "and have been invited to sign this agreement."
- Add WHEREAS clause regarding Advisory Council on Historic Preservation
 participation: "WHEREAS, USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic
 Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and
 ACHP has (decided) (declined) to participate; and".
- "Built environment resources" should be changed to "built historic properties" (Stipulation I.A. and II) or "built historic property" (Stipulation I.C).
- 4. Stipulation II, paragraph 1, line 4: "effected" should be "affected."
- 5. Stipulation IV.A, paragraph 2, lines 6-8: revise to incorporate phrase "unless more time is requested" into 30 day timeframe.
- Stipulation VI, line 2: "data recover/mitigation" should be "data recovery/ mitigation.
- Stipulation VIII: Add reporting requirement/follow up consultation for any operations conducted pursuant to this section. Recommend within 15 days.
- 8. Stipulation IX.B: replace "etc" with "and similar activities" (line 2) and delete second "developed" (line 3).
- Regarding exempt activities (Stipulation IX): PA should specify that personnel
 with appropriate cultural resources professional qualifications make the
 determination that a particular undertaking falls under these exempt activities.

- Stipulation XI. Add reporting sub-section that specifies preparation of an annual report that summarizes activities carried out under this PA (number of exempt activities, etc.).
- 11. Section XI.C: HPD recommends an initial five year duration beginning on the date of the last signatory that upon expiration (of the initial term) may be renewed or extended for another five years. Also, HPD suggests including a time frame for termination, for example that signatories may terminate the agreement by providing 90 day written notice and explanation of reasons for termination.
- 12. Signatory for HPD should read: Dr. rather than Mr. David Crass.
- 13. Cooperating agencies should be grouped under "Invited Signatory Parties" heading following "Signatory Parties."

GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER, AND ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HISTORIC PRESERVATION (to be determined) REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 34,667 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP has decided/declined (to be determined) to participate; and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, Cooperating Agencies, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

The USMC will strive to undertake identification efforts within up to eight (8) proposed target areas, totaling approximately 2,000 acres, before any land acquisition, should it occur. The intent of these efforts will be to gather baseline information for the Environmental Impact

Statement (EIS) and to identify resources that may constitute "historic properties" (any prehistoric or historic district, site, building, structure, or object included in, or eligible for, the National Register of Historic Places) to aid in the decision making and planning processes.

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO and ACHP to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO and ACHP as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:
 - i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
 - ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
 - c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
 - d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC,

Cooperating Agencies, GA SHPO, and ACHP shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and the ACHP, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.



The United States Marine Corps (USMC) is writing in regard to the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR), located in McIntosh County, Georgia. The USMC invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the consultation for this undertaking and the development of a Section 106 Programmatic Agreement; the ACHP responded on September 6, 2011 (Enclosure 1). We are writing now to update you of the status of the Section 106 consultation with consulting parties, our efforts to identify historic properties within the Area of Potential Effects (APE), and to once again invite the ACHP to participate in this consultation and the development of the Programmatic Agreement for this undertaking.

As you know, the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) was afforded details of the undertaking and recommended the development of a Programmatic Agreement pursuant to 36 CFR 800.14 (b) (1) (ii) as the effects of this undertaking on historic properties, should they be present, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of this undertaking. The USMC provided the GA SHPO a copy of the Draft PA and they provided minor comments (Enclosure 2, letter dated September 15, 2011). The USMC revised the Draft PA to address their comments and the GA SHPO indicated that the PA is adequate to address effects to historic properties (Enclosure 2, letter dated November 22, 2011).

A copy of the revised Draft PA is provided as Enclosure (3) for your consideration.

Please note that the project APE (Enclosure 3, Exhibit A) has been altered since our last correspondence. The APE now encompasses approximately 34,667-acres of land identified as Area 1 (11,187-acres) and Area 3 (23,480-acres), rather than the 51,580-acre APE first considered, as Area 2 located adjacent to the Altamaha River has been eliminated from consideration. Area 2 does not meet

minimum training requirements and is frequently flooded and inaccessible for range maintenance and clearance.

The USMC has made a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties within the proposed APE. This effort included a record search of the Georgia Archaeological Site Files and historic map review, an archaeological survey of select proposed target areas, a built environment investigation within the APE, and consultation with a wide variety of consulting parties.

The results of the record search and historic map review are presented in Enclosure 3 (see Exhibit B). As few cultural resources inventory efforts previously were conducted within the proposed APE, the USMC made a considerable effort to secure access to portions of the private land under consideration for this undertaking to conduct historic property identification investigations to facilitate future planning efforts and to provide information to consulting parties so they can make an informed decision as to the possible effects on historic properties from this undertaking.

The USMC was able to secure Right-of-Entry for approximately 1,730 acres of land within the APE in order to conduct an archaeological survey of select, proposed target locations. Nine new archaeological sites (5 prehistoric, 4 multi-component) and eleven isolated finds (8 prehistoric, 3 historic) were identified during the investigation. A description of the newly identified resources is provided in Enclosure (4). Based on the results of this survey effort and the results of previous inventories, SEARCH Inc., the archaeological Contractor who conducted the survey, developed a predictive model identifying areas with high and low probability for preservation of archaeological deposits within the remainder of the APE. This model, once the GA SHPO and other consulting parties have concurred with its application, will be incorporated into the PA to quide future Section 110 archaeological survey efforts in the acquired land parcels. SEARCH, Inc., is currently preparing the technical report for this investigation.

The built-environment survey identified one resource within the project APE that was not identified by the pre-survey records search and historic map review. This resource, the Rozier Cemetery, is located within the undertaking's proposed safety buffer zone. The cemetery contains a single marker for Benjamin B. Rozier, a Third Corporal in the McIntosh Light Dragoons. The marker was placed by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and it is not known if this is merely a memorial marker or whether any actual remains are present.

The USMC shall strive to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to historic properties pursuant to the proposed Programmatic Agreement, should the land on which these resources are located be acquired as part of this undertaking.

The USMC consulted with 21 different federally recognized Tribes (see Enclosure 3, Exhibit C) as well as local governments, land-

owners, a local historical society, and various environmental/conservation groups (Enclosure 5). The responses can be seen in Enclosure (6). One Native American Tribe (Eastern Shawnee Tribe) indicated that they wished to sign the PA as a consulting party that concurs. Four Tribes (Alabama-Coushatta tribe of Texas, Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma, Miccosukee Tribe of Florida, and the United Keetowah Tribe of Cherokee Indians) indicated that they have no comments on the undertaking or that the undertaking is beyond their scope of interest in Georgia. Three Tribes (Catawba Indian Nation, Seminole Tribe of Florida, and the Muscogee Creek Nation) requested additional information from the USMC. The USMC provided results of the recent archaeological investigation to each of the Tribes, as well as the additional information (plant species list, record search results, photographs of the project area). These Tribes have not responded with any further comments.

The USMC has performed its due diligence to identify historic properties within the proposed APE. The USMC also believes that, once implemented, the PA shall adequately address effects to historic properties within the APE, should they be present and the land is acquired by the Government.

We look forward to receiving your decision on whether the ACHP will elect to participate in this consultation. Please respond in writing with your decision within 15-days of receipt. Dear Mr. Drawdy:

On August 15, 2011, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) received your notification for the referenced project which was submitted in accordance with Section 800.6(a)(1) of our regulations, "Protection of Historic Properties" (36 CFR Part 800). Unfortunately, the background documentation included with your submission does not meet the specifications listed in Section 800.11(e). We, therefore, are unable to determine whether Appendix A of the regulations, *Criteria for Council Involvement in Reviewing Individual Section 106 Cases*, applies to this undertaking. Accordingly, we request that you submit the following information so that we can determine whether our participation is warranted.

- A description of the affected historic properties, including information on the characteristics that qualify them for the National Register;
- A description of the undertaking's effects on historic properties,
- An explanation of why the criteria of adverse effect were found applicable or inapplicable; and
- Copies or summaries of any views provided by consulting parties and the public, including comments from Indian tribes, and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO).

Upon receipt of the additional information, we will notify you within 15 days of our decision. If you have any questions or require further assistance, please contact Louise Brodnitz at 202-606-8527, or via email at lbrodnitz@achp.gov.

The Historic Preservation Division (HPD) is in receipt of the draft Programmatic Agreement (PA) for the above referenced undertaking in McIntosh County, Georgia. Our comments are offered to assist the United States Marine Corps (MC) and Naval Facilities Engineering Command Southeast (NAVFAC SE) in complying with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

Thank you for providing the draft PA for the proposed expansion and modernization of the Townsend Bombing Range in McIntosh County, Georgia for our review and comments. HPD offers the following recommendations concerning revisions/additions:

- Regarding cooperating agencies, which consist of GA Air National Guard (GA ANG), Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and United States Corps of Engineers (USACE), the 7th WHEREAS clause should be revised to include the following: "and have been invited to sign this agreement."
- Add WHEREAS clause regarding Advisory Council on Historic Preservation
 participation: "WHEREAS, USMC has invited the Advisory Council on Historic
 Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and
 ACHP has (decided) (declined) to participate; and".
- "Built environment resources" should be changed to "built historic properties" (Stipulation I.A. and II) or "built historic property" (Stipulation I.C).
- 4. Stipulation II, paragraph 1, line 4: "effected" should be "affected."
- 5. Stipulation IV.A, paragraph 2, lines 6-8: revise to incorporate phrase "unless more time is requested" into 30 day timeframe.
- Stipulation VI, line 2: "data recover/mitigation" should be "data recovery/ mitigation.
- Stipulation VIII: Add reporting requirement/follow up consultation for any
 operations conducted pursuant to this section. Recommend within 15 days.
- 8. Stipulation IX.B: replace "etc" with "and similar activities" (line 2) and delete second "developed" (line 3).
- Regarding exempt activities (Stipulation IX): PA should specify that personnel
 with appropriate cultural resources professional qualifications make the
 determination that a particular undertaking falls under these exempt activities.

- Stipulation XI. Add reporting sub-section that specifies preparation of an annual report that summarizes activities carried out under this PA (number of exempt activities, etc.).
- 11. Section XI.C: HPD recommends an initial five year duration beginning on the date of the last signatory that upon expiration (of the initial term) may be renewed or extended for another five years. Also, HPD suggests including a time frame for termination, for example that signatories may terminate the agreement by providing 90 day written notice and explanation of reasons for termination.
- 12. Signatory for HPD should read: Dr. rather than Mr. David Crass.
- 13. Cooperating agencies should be grouped under "Invited Signatory Parties" heading following "Signatory Parties."

PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS AND GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 34,667 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP declined to participate (February 15, 2012 letter); and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, GA ANG, and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of

archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to the ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:

- i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
- ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
- c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - ii. Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
- d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC, GA ANG, GA SHPO shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.




Exhibit B: Record Search Results

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 34,667 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP declined to participate (February 15, 2012 letter); and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, GA ANG, and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of

archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

- (1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.
- (2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to the ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:

- i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
- ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
- c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - ii. Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
- d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC, GA ANG, GA SHPO shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.



SEARCH Inc., the archaeological Contractor who conducted the survey, is currently preparing the technical report for this investigation. This report is slated for completion in spring 2012.

The built-environment survey identified one resource within the project APE that was not identified by the pre-survey records search. This resource, the Rozier Cemetery, is located within the undertaking's proposed safety buffer zone. The cemetery contains a single marker for Benjamin B. Rozier, a Third Corporal in the McIntosh Light Dragoons. The marker was placed by the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and it is not known if this is merely a memorial marker or whether any actual remains are present.

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PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS AND GEORGIA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER REGARDING THE PROPOSED EXPANSION AND MODERNIZATION OF THE TOWNSEND BOMBING RANGE, GEORGIA

WHEREAS, the United States Marine Corps (USMC), the lead agency, proposes to expand and modernize the Townsend Bombing Range (TBR) in Georgia to provide a modern air-to-ground training range that can safely accommodate the use of inert (non explosive) Precision Guided Munitions (PGMs) and other air-to-ground weapons; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the proposed expansion and modernization of TBR, and subsequent use of the expanded TBR footprint for military training activities, constitutes a Federal undertaking (hereafter Undertaking) pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA); and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may include the acquisition of upwards of 34,667 acres of land within Long and McIntosh Counties, Georgia (Areas 1 and 3, Exhibit A), and the Area of Potential Effects (APE) is defined as this geographical footprint; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking includes the acquisition of land and timber rights, the minor modification to existing airspace, the construction of required infrastructure (target areas, support facilities, roads, fencing, etc.), and use of the acquired land for military training; and

WHEREAS, the USMC proposes to develop up to eight target areas totaling approximately 2,000 acres of land, and the majority of land proposed for acquisition constitutes Weapon Danger Zones (WDZs), also known as safety zones, to accommodate guidance malfunctions to a 1-in-1,000,000 probability; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expansion of the TBR would be accomplished through the purchase of properties that are currently owned by private parties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Air National Guard (GA ANG) has decided to participate as a Cooperating Agency and has been invited to sign this agreement; and

WHEREAS, the USMC invited the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to participate in the development of this agreement and the ACHP declined to participate (February 15, 2012 letter); and

WHEREAS, the GA ANG, which provides daily operational control and maintenance on the existing TBR, would continue to do so on any newly acquired range lands; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges its Federal responsibility to identify and evaluate historic properties within any land that is acquired with the intent to avoid, minimize, or mitigate effects to historic properties; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Archaeological Site Files, Georgia Historic Preservation Division records, and map review indicates the presence of archaeological sites and historic built environment (buildings, structures, objects) within the proposed APE (Exhibit B), and

WHEREAS, the USMC has consulted with federally recognized Native American Tribes (Exhibit C) with the intent to identify any historic properties or resources that have been ascribed standing as "traditional cultural properties," "sacred sites," or "sites of religious or cultural importance" and no such properties were identified by those consulting parties; and

WHEREAS, the USMC acknowledges that the effects on historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area, cannot be fully determined prior to the approval of the Undertaking; and

WHEREAS, the Undertaking has the potential to adversely affect historic properties, if present within the proposed expansion area; and

WHEREAS, the USMC may purchase properties that are most advantageous to the government for the purposes of this Undertaking, and the USMC cannot be compelled to purchase properties on which historic properties are located as a means of safeguarding or treating those resources; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the USMC, GA ANG, and the Georgia State Historic Preservation Officer (GA SHPO) agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to satisfy the Marine Corps' NHPA Section 106 and Section 110 (16 U.S.C. 470h-2) responsibilities for all individual actions included in the Undertaking.

STIPULATIONS

The USMC shall ensure the following measures are carried out as indicated:

I. IDENTIFICATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

A. Areas to be Developed

All areas to be developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be surveyed for archaeological and built environment resources, unless they have been previously surveyed, prior to any construction and/or use in accordance with 36 CFR 800.4(b).

B. Weapon Danger Zones and Buffer Zones

The USMC shall, in consultation with the GA SHPO, identify areas of higher archaeological probability within any land acquired as part of this Undertaking. The USMC or its contractors shall develop archaeological probability maps for the acquired lands using a combination of

archival research, Light Detection and Ranging (LIDAR) data to aid in the identification of archaeological resources (earthen mounds, earthworks, ditches, elevated land surfaces, etc.), soil drainage data as discussed in the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001), and data on any natural factors (closeness to water, etc.) that may have influenced settlement (prehistoric and historic).

The USMC shall develop a sampling strategy in consultation with the GA SHPO to survey any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking for use as WDZs or general buffer zones. The areas identified for survey in the sampling strategy shall be surveyed for archaeological resources in accordance with Section 110 of the NHPA of 1966, as amended, as funding permits.

C. Survey Standards

The USMC will conduct the aforementioned identification investigations pursuant to accepted fieldwork standards promulgated in the "Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys" (2001), or through consultation with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes if different methods are proposed. Archaeological and built environment resources surveys will be performed by qualified personnel who meet or exceed the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

II. EVALUATION OF CULTURAL RESOURCES

The USMC, in keeping with its Federal preservation responsibilities, shall evaluate archaeological sites and built environment resources within land acquired as part of this Undertaking for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility, prioritizing such evaluations based on the potential for resources to be affected by USMC activities. Resources shall be evaluated in terms of NRHP eligibility pursuant to the National Register criteria found at 36 CFR 60.4, and appropriate guidance, published and unpublished, from the Department of Interior National Park Service National Register Program and the GA SHPO.

The USMC acknowledges the fact that any identified historic properties on properties that are not purchased by the government will not convey any historic preservation responsibilities on the private property owner after the termination of identification efforts.

III. ADVERSE EFFECTS

The USMC shall consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, particularly those within proposed target areas, and areas of proposed construction (buildings, roads, fences, etc.), where effects to historic properties, should they occur, would be adverse.

If effects to historic properties located in these areas cannot be avoided or minimized, the USMC shall resolve adverse effects per 36 CFR 800.6.

The USMC acknowledges that it will treat all identified historic properties on purchased properties with the intent to maintain the qualifying characteristics of those resources.

IV. REPORTING

A. Cultural Resource Investigations

The USMC will submit to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes draft reports describing the aforementioned identification and evaluation efforts. These reports will address in detail background research, environmental and cultural contexts, fieldwork techniques, and identified archaeological or architectural historical resources. These reports will also tender recommendations regarding the eligibility of such resources, whenever possible, or propose expanded field investigations to evaluate eligibility, when warranted.

Reports documenting identification and evaluation efforts shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (1983) and the Georgia Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Surveys (2001). The USMC will submit draft copies of reports to the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes for review and concurrence with any eligibility determinations. If the GA SHPO and Native American tribes fail to respond in writing within 30 days, unless more time is requested before the closure of that 30-day time period, it may be assumed that these reviewers have no comments on the report and the USMC will finalize the report. If comments are received from the GA SHPO or Native American tribes within 30-days, the USMC will address any comments and consult with the GA SHPO and appropriate Native American tribes to successfully finalize the reports.

B. Integrated Cultural Resource Management Plan

The USMC will include any land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking into the Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Beaufort Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP), or develop a separate Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan pursuant to SECNAVINST 4000.35A, 6(b)12 and Marine Corps Order 5090.2A, change 2, chapter 8. The ICRMP will enable land managers to efficiently manage historic properties should they exist. The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes in the preparation of the ICRMP and distribute copies for their confidential review and use.

C. Annual Report

The USMC shall prepare an Annual Report summarizing activities carried out under this PA, including any exempt activities described below in Stipulation IX. The Annual Report shall be submitted to all Signatory Parties.

V. PLANNING AND COORDINATION

The USMC will consult with the GA SHPO and any interested Native American tribes pursuant to Section 106 in the event that future actions entail the acquisition of new property and/or new construction that could affect historic properties. The USMC will maintain regular contact with the GA SHPO and provide updates on any component of cultural resources investigations, as requested.

VI. CURATION

All artifacts, field notes, maps, drawings, and data resulting from archaeological investigations (surveys, evaluation, and data recovery/mitigation efforts) conducted on government land acquired as part of this Undertaking shall be curated at a repository that meets the 36 CFR 79 standards. The only exception to this policy will be Native American cultural items (human remains, associated funerary objects, unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and cultural patrimony) as defined by, and subject to, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990 (NAGPRA). If NAGPRA cultural items are found on government owned lands acquired as part of this Undertaking, attempts will be made to repatriate to the appropriate federally recognized Tribe or Tribes in accordance with NAGPRA (25 USC 3001-3013, 43 CFR & 10).

VII. INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES AND UNANTICIPATED EFFECTS

The GA ANG will periodically inspect the target areas as mission needs permit and/or require. Any inadvertent discoveries of archaeological resources, or observed unanticipated effects to historic properties, made during these inspections or during routine maintenance and/or operation of the range, shall be treated in accordance with the procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800.13. If the discovery of human remains occurs on government owned land during the implementation of the Undertaking, the USMC and GA ANG shall take reasonable and prudent steps to ensure that the human remains are protected and preserved in place (if possible). If the remains are determined to be Native American, the USMC and GA ANG shall treat the remains in accordance with NAGPRA.

The GA ANG will treat all such discoveries with care, and manage these discoveries and unanticipated effects to avoid or minimize harm to historic properties, pending the outcome of consultation with the GA SHPO, any interested Native American tribes, and other interested parties regarding the significance, treatment, and/or disposition of the discoveries.

VIII. EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In the event that natural disasters or other emergency events (aircraft mishaps, hazardous spills, etc.) occur, the USMC and GA ANG may take actions that affect historic properties without consultation with the GA SHPO to preserve life, stabilize any involved historic properties, and prevent further damage to property, consistent with 36 CFR 800.12. Immediate rescue and salvage operations conducted to preserve life or property shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Emergency response work may include, but is not limited to, conducting emergency clean-up operations, search and rescue operations for aircrew, establishing crash site security, and the retrieval of ordnance/equipment outside of established target impact areas that pose a threat to human health and safety. To the extent possible and practical, USMC and GA ANG emergency response teams, or other emergency response personnel, will be provided with information concerning the locations of known historic properties, and shall strive to avoid or minimize damage to historic properties and potential historic properties when responding to emergency situations.

The USMC and/or GA ANG shall notify the GA SHPO as soon as practical but no later than thirty days of the need of said emergency action.

IX. EXEMPT ACTIVITIES

The following activities and undertakings shall be exempt from survey and/or Section 106 review. The determination that an undertaking is exempt shall be made by an individual who meets or exceeds the professional standards described in 48FR44716 (Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, September 29, 1983).

A. Ordnance Removal Projects

Ordnance retrieval and/or removal projects within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that has been surveyed for archaeological resources and is devoid of historic properties shall be exempt from Section 106 consultation. The retrieval of ordnance outside of target impact areas established as part of this Undertaking that poses a threat to human health and safety shall also be exempt from the provisions of Section 106 of the NHPA per 36 CFR 800.12(d). Archaeological survey shall not be required in any portion or portions of the property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking that are later determined to be former military ranges containing Unexploded Ordnance (UXO) or Munitions and Explosives of Concern (MEC) that would pose an unacceptable level of risk to human health and safety to survey personnel.

B. Routine Land Maintenance Activities

Routine land maintenance activities, including but not limited to grass cutting, bush hogging, tree trimming, and similar activities within the portions of the APE that have been surveyed and developed (target areas, roads, support facilities, fencing, etc.) as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

C. Routine Road Maintenance and Utility Repair Projects

Routine road maintenance and resurfacing where work is confined to previously maintained surfaces, ditches, culverts, and cut and fill slopes where there are no known historic properties or historic properties would not be affected because proposed work is clearly within a disturbed context shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Repairs and/or maintenance of utility lines taking place within existing disturbed utility trenches will also be exempt from Section 106 review.

D. Cemetery Maintenance Activities

Routine maintenance, including but not limited to clearing of vegetation, reseeding, fencing, and general maintenance work, for any cemeteries identified within land acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

E. Natural Resources Management and Forestry

Any outdoor recreational programs, such as hunting and fishing events sponsored by the USMC and/or the GA ANG on lands acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall be exempt from Section 106 review.

Due to the historical land use (Timber Industry activity) of the area, prescribed or controlled burning for species and forest management will not be subject to Section 106 review. The plowing of pre-existing firebreaks within any property acquired by the government as part of this Undertaking, and within the extant TBR, shall not require Section 106 review provided the plowing is confined to pre-existing horizontal and vertical disturbance. Timber harvesting and re-planting activity also shall not be subject to Section 106 review provided ground disturbance from this activity is not greater than that of historical land use or does not disturb areas where this activity has not previously occurred.

X. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The USMC shall ensure public access to this Programmatic Agreement (PA) as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process when the Draft Record of Decision (40 CFR 1501.7(a)(1)) is released for public comment.

XI. ADMINISTRATIVE STIPULATIONS

A. Dispute Resolution

Should a Signatory object to actions carried out or proposed with respect to the implementation of this PA, the objecting party shall provide all other Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, with written documentation of the objection. The parties will consult, as appropriate, for up to 30 days to resolve the objection.

(1) If agreement is reached, the USMC will summarize the resolution and provide the information to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur.

(2) If agreement is not reached, the USMC will refer the matter to the ACHP consistent with subpart B of this Stipulation.

Objections not resolved through discussions among the parties within the 30-day dispute resolution process defined above shall be addressed as follows.

- (1) Exceptions. If the dispute involves the National Register eligibility of a property, the USMC may elect to submit the matter to the Keeper of the National Register, consistent with 36 CFR §60.9.
- (2) Continuing Actions
 - a. The USMC may provide the parties to the PA with information regarding actions the USMC believes could continue without interfering with the dispute resolution process.
 - b. Within 15 days of receiving the USMC's plan for continuing action, the ACHP will provide comments on the USMC's plan.
 - c. The USMC will take ACHP comments into account, notify the parties to the dispute of the USMC's decision on possible continuing actions, and proceed accordingly.
- (3) Resolution Process
 - a. The USMC shall forward relevant documentation to the ACHP with the USMC's proposed resolution.
 - b. Within 30 days of receiving the USMC's proposed resolution, the ACHP shall:

- i. Concur with the USMC's proposed resolution; or
- ii. Provide the USMC with recommendations on the proposed resolution.
- c. Within 30 days of receiving comments from the ACHP, the USMC shall:
 - i. Take into account ACHP's recommendations in making a final decision on the matter; and
 - ii. Provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public; and proceed consistent with its decision.
- d. If the ACHP has not responded within 30 days, the USMC shall provide written documentation of the USMC's decision to the Signatory Parties, and Consulting Parties that Concur, and the public and proceed with its decision.

B. Amendments, Non-Compliance and Termination

If any Signatory or Invited Signatory party believes that the terms of this PA are not being honored or cannot be carried out, or that an amendment to its terms should be made, that signatory will immediately consult with the other signatories to consider and develop amendments to the PA per 36 CFR Part 800.6(c)(7) and Part 800.6(c)(8).

If this PA is not amended as provided for in this stipulation, Signatory or Invited Signatory parties may terminate the agreement by providing a 90-day written notice to all signatories explaining the reason(s) for termination.

If this PA is terminated and the USMC determines that the Undertaking will proceed, the USMC shall comply with 36 CFR Part 800.14(b)(2)(v).

C. Duration of the PA

This PA shall have a duration of five years beginning on the date of the final signature by the Signatory Parties. Six months prior to the expiration of the existing term of the PA, the USMC, GA ANG, GA SHPO shall review the PA for possible amendment and renewal for subsequent five year term(s).

D. Anti-Deficiency Act

The Anti-Deficiency Act 31 U.S.C. §1341 prohibits federal agencies from incurring an obligation of funds in advance of or in excess of available appropriations. Accordingly, the parties agree that any requirement for the obligation of funds arising from the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the availability of appropriated funds for that purpose, and that this agreement shall not be interpreted to require the obligation or expenditure of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act.

The obligations of this PA as to the USMC are severable. If the USMC cannot perform any obligation set forth in this PA because of the unavailability of funds, the parties intend that the remainder of the PA be executed to the greatest extent practicable. The parties agree to consult on any obligation of the PA that cannot be performed because of the unavailability of funds.

E. Effective Date

This PA shall take effect on the date that it has been fully executed by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO.

F. Execution

Execution and implementation of the terms of this PA by the USMC, GA ANG, the GA SHPO, and its filing with the ACHP, evidence that the USMC has afforded the ACHP a reasonable opportunity to comment on the Undertaking and its effect(s) on historic properties, and that the USMC has satisfied its responsibilities under Section 106 of the NHPA and applicable implementing regulation for all aspects of the Undertaking.


